I Hope You Like Math...

Using big-O notation.

- (a) For each pair of functions f(n) and g(n), state whether f(n) = O(g(n)), $f(n) = \Omega(g(n))$, or $f(n) = \Theta(g(n))$. For example, for $f(n) = n^2$ and $g(n) = 2n^2 n + 3$, write $f(n) = \Theta(g(n))$.
 - f(n) = n and $g(n) = n^2 n$
 - $f(n) = n^2$ and $g(n) = n^2 + n$
 - f(n) = 8n and $g(n) = n \log n$
 - $f(n) = 2^n$ and $g(n) = n^2$
 - $f(n) = 3^n$ and $g(n) = 2^{2n}$
- (b) For each of the following functions f(n), state the order of growth using Θ notation. For example, for f(n) = n + 5 write $f(n) = \Theta(n)$.
 - f(n) = 50
 - $f(n) = n^2 2n + 3$
 - $f(n) = n + \cdots + 2 + 1$
 - $f(n) = n^{100} + 1.01^n$
 - $\bullet \ f(n) = n^{1.1} + n \log n$

Answers:

(a)
$$\bullet \ f(n) = O(g(n))$$

- $f(n) = \Theta(g(n))$
- f(n) = O(g(n))
- $f(n) = \Omega(g(n))$
- f(n) = O(g(n))

(b)
$$\bullet$$
 $f(n) = \Theta(1)$

•
$$f(n) = \Theta(n^2)$$

•
$$f(n) = \frac{(n+1)n}{2} = \Theta(n^2)$$

•
$$f(n) = \Theta(1.01^n)$$

•
$$f(n) = \Theta(n^{1.1})$$

Code Analysis

For the pseudo-code snippet below, give the asymptotic running time in Θ notation. Assume that basic arithmetic operations (+,-,×, and /) are constant time.

$$\begin{aligned} & \mathbf{for} \ i := 1 \ \mathbf{to} \ n \ \mathbf{do} \\ & j := 0; \\ & \mathbf{while} \ j \le i \ \mathbf{do} \\ & j := j + 2 \end{aligned}$$

Answer:

The inner loop takes time i/2, so the running time is

$$\sum_{i=1}^n i/2 = \Theta(n^2).$$
